

Llevar- talking about what you and others are wearing

- Verbs are action words.
- Verbs, like ser and llevar, are NOT masculine or feminine.
- The verb “llevar” means to wear & to carry
- A verb can be called conjugated or infinitive & singular or plural (talking about 1 person or more than 1)
- To conjugate means to change the spelling of the verb to agree with people or things you’re describing.
- Infinitive means the verb in its original form llevar or in English to wear/carry.
- I remember the endings of the verb, llevar, because they coincide with me llamo, te llamas and se llama.

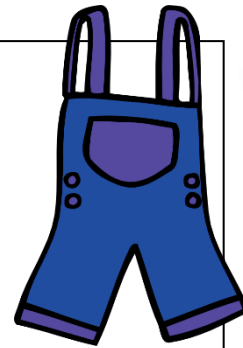
Yo llevo means I wear/ I am wearing

Tú llevas means you (inf.) wear/ You (inf) are wearing.

Él lleva means he wears/he is wearing

Ella lleva means she wears/ she is wearing

Usted lleva means you (for) wear, you (for) are wearing



Remember that:

- un/una = a(n), one
- unos/unas = some
- You choose the spelling based on the clothing/thing that comes after

Let's practice:

I am wearing a scarf. Yo llevo una bufanda.

She is wearing a dress. Ella lleva un vestido.

He is wearing a red jacket. Él lleva una chaqueta roja.

I am not wearing socks. Yo no llevo calcetines.

- To ask what someone is wearing, informally: ¿Qué llevas tú?
- To ask what he/she is wearing: ¿Qué lleva él/ella/Name?

Llevar- talking about what you and others are wearing

Conjugation chart for

Llevar= to wear, to carry

llevo (yo)	Llevamos name y yo (nosotros/as)
llevas (tú) talking to a friend, family member, peer, child	lleváis name y tú (vosotros/as) talking to a group of familiar people see tú
lleva boy's name girl's name talking to a professional, costa rica, talking to an adult. (él, ella, ud.)	llevan name y name name y usted (ellos, ellas, uds.) talking to a group of formal people see usted
